

Bachelor's Degree in Philosophy of Religion

Program Overview

The Bachelor's Degree in Philosophy of Religion at the Universidad Católica Americana (UNICA) represents an integral educational proposal that unites the philosophical tradition of critical reason with the systematic study of the religious phenomenon in its multiple dimensions — conceptual, existential, linguistic, and ethical.

Within the biblical and ecclesial tradition, the *Philosophy of Religion* serves as the intellectual bridge that enables faith to give reason for itself (*Logos*), examining the rationality of religious beliefs, the validity of their arguments, and the coherence of their claims about God, humanity, and the cosmos. It is not confined to a single confession but rather explores the religious fact as a constitutive element of human existence.

This vocation for the faith—reason dialogue is renewed in the contemporary context through metaphysics, comparative ethics, and analytic philosophy—disciplines that seek to understand the essence of the divine, the meaning of religious language, the problem of evil, and the pluralism of beliefs.

UNICA's *Bachelor's Degree in Philosophy of Religion* provides an interdisciplinary formation that combines logic, fundamental theology, history of religions, and analytic philosophy—preparing professionals capable of:

- Understanding and evaluating the main arguments for and against the existence of God
- Participating in public debate on ethics, science, and faith through rigorous philosophical reasoning.
- Supporting interreligious and intercultural dialogue processes by understanding the philosophical roots of diverse worldviews.
- Leading research and teaching projects in the field of philosophy and religion.

Thanks to its virtual and hybrid modality, the program is accessible to students from various contexts, who may conduct research seminars and teaching practices in their home regions or at partner institutions. Likewise, its bilingual (Spanish–English) format opens doors for intellectual dialogue in multicultural and international settings.



Through this degree, UNICA reaffirms its commitment to the mission of the Church and society: to form teachers and professors for seminaries and Catholic schools who are witnesses of faith through reason, in the spirit of the Gospel and the Church's Social Doctrine.

Justification

The *Bachelor's Degree in Philosophy of Religion* is fundamentally relevant to the life and mission of the Church, serving as an intellectual tool for dialogue with culture, science, and other spiritual traditions.

- 1. **Formation of Priests:** It is essential for contemporary apologetics. A priest trained in this discipline is equipped to understand and respond to the challenges of secularism, atheism, and scientism. It enables him to defend the rationality of faith and to address the existential questions of his community (suffering, the meaning of life) with deep conceptual rigor.
- 2. Formation of Committed Laity: Laypeople, immersed in an environment of pluralism and skepticism, need tools for discernment. This degree equips them to be cultural dialogue agents, capable of articulating the truth of Christianity in contemporary philosophical language, promoting religious freedom and critical thinking in public life.
- 3. **Pastoral and Interfaith Leaders:** This discipline facilitates genuine ecumenical and interreligious dialogue, grounded in knowledge of other worldviews. It enables pastoral leaders to understand the philosophical and anthropological roots of various religions (and atheism), ensuring that unity or cooperation efforts rest on mutual intellectual respect and a shared pursuit of the transcendentals—Truth, Goodness, and Beauty.

Admission Requirements (Profile and Documentation)

- High School Diploma or equivalent GED recognized by educational authorities.
- Certified transcripts / secondary academic record.
- Personal essay (motivation letter on the relationship between faith, reason, and the religious phenomenon).
- Admission interview (academic and vocational/intellectual).



- One pastoral or academic recommendation.
- Demonstration of language proficiency according to the chosen modality (see language section).
- For international students: compliance with applicable immigration and visa regulations.
- The university may include additional requirements according to institutional and accreditation standards.

Purpose of Formation

To train professionals in *Philosophy of Religion* with a solid metaphysical foundation and a profound understanding of religious traditions, capable of researching, teaching, and engaging in public debate about truth, the meaning of life, and the existence of God.

Learning Outcomes

Upon completion, the graduate in *Philosophy of Religion* will be able to:

- Analyze fundamental questions in the philosophy of religion, including theistic and atheistic arguments.
- Apply logic and philosophical reasoning to the study of religious statements and experiences.
- Integrate philosophical reasoning with the data of Revelation in Natural Theology.
- Design and lead research and teaching projects on ethics, religion, and culture.
- Promote dialogue with atheism, agnosticism, and various religious traditions.
- Develop reading and comprehension skills for philosophical and religious texts in their original languages (Latin/Greek/Hebrew).
- Critically evaluate the influence of religion on politics, science, and society.

Competencies

- **Specific:** Metaphysics of the Supreme Being, Theistic Logic, Ethics of Belief, History of Religious Thought, Religious Language, Natural Theology.

Methodology and Evaluation

- **Mixed methodology:** Synchronous/asynchronous classes, reading seminars of primary sources (texts in Latin/Greek, in translation or original), logic and argumentation workshops, structured debates, and field practices in interreligious dialogue centers.
- Continuous evaluation: Logic exercises, source analysis and translation, argumentative essays, critical reading reports, original philosophical research, and thesis defense.
- In bilingual modality: Social and linguistic competencies are evaluated in both languages.
